

WSIS Forum 2012 (14-18 May)

- Agenda of the WSIS Forum built upon a six phased (11 October 2011- 16 April 2012)
 Open Consultation Process on the Thematic Aspects and Innovations on the Format
- Onsite Participation:
 - The Forum attracted more than 1300 WSIS Stakeholders from more than 140 countries.
 - Several high-level representatives of the wider WSIS Stakeholder community graced the Forum, more than 35 Ministers
 and Deputies, Ambassadors, CEOs and Civil Society leaders contributed towards the programme of the Forum.
 - Among participants there were several C-level representatives of the private sector and civil society
- Remote participation was an integral component of the WSIS Forum over 1000 stakeholders followed and contributed to the outcomes of the event in a remote manner from all parts of world.
- Onsite networking was facilitated by the imeetYouatWSIS online community platform.
 More than 600 on-site participants have actively used the tool prior and during the event which has facilitated in fruitful networking leading to win-win partnerships.
- The Forum was followed on social networks #wsis in Twitter and WSIS Process page on Facebook.















WSIS Forum 2012 (14-18 May)

- WSIS Stakeholders, i.e. Governments, International Organizations, Action Line Facilitators from various UN agencies, UN Regional Commissions, the Private Sector, and Civil Society:
 - reported and assessed their own efforts towards WSIS implementation and follow-up
 - shared their future plans to achieve the targets set in the WSIS+10 plan of action in the WSIS Outcome documents.
- Programme of the Forum consisted of more than
 150 sessions structured in 20 different types of meetings in 7 parallel streams.

WSIS PROJECT PRIZES

WSIS Project Prizes recognize excellence in the implementation of projects and initiatives which further the goals of the World Summit on the Information Society (WSIS) in improving connectivity to information and communication technologies (ICTs) in line with the 11 Action Lines laid out in the WSIS outcome documents

The Project Prizes respond to the requests expressed by WSIS stakeholders during the WSIS Forum 2011, to create a mechanism to evaluate and reward stakeholders for their efforts on the implementation of WSIS outcomes.

United Nations Economic and Social Council (ECOSOC) resolution 2012/5 "Assessment of the progress made in the implementation of and follow-up to the outcomes of the World Summit on the Information Society" reiterates the importance of sharing the best practices at the global level, and while recognizing excellence in the implementation of the projects and initiatives which further the WSIS goals, encourages all stakeholders to nominate their projects to the annual WSIS Project Prizes, as an integral part of the WSIS Stocktaking process, while noting the report on the WSIS Success Stories.



WSIS PROJECT PRIZES 2012

ITU Secretary-General Dr. Hamadoun Touré announced the winners of 18 WSIS Project Prizes, as part of the Opening Ceremony of the WSIS Forum 2012 event, which took place in Geneva.

The ceremony was followed by a day-long series of showcasing sessions on project implementation.

All projects are reflected in the 2012 edition of the WSIS Stocktaking Report on Success Stories.





Measuring the Information Society

- Two authoritative benchmarking tools to monitor information society developments worldwide.
- The ICT Development Index (IDI) ranks 155 countries' performance with regard to information and communication technology (ICT) infrastructure and uptake.
- The ICT Price Basket (IPB) is a unique metric that tracks and compares the cost and affordability of ICT services in more than 160 countries globally. Both the IDI and the IPB combined are powerful measures for benchmarking and explaining differences among countries and within regions when it comes to ICT developments.
- This year's edition of the report also features brand new data and analyses on revenue and investment in the ICT sector and proposes a new methodology to measure the world's telecommunication capacity.
- The MIS 2012 report will be launched on 11 October, 2012.









The 10th World Telecommunication/ICT Indicators Meeting (WTIM)

- 25-27 September, 2012, in Bangkok, Thailand.
- Organized by the ITU Telecommunication Development Bureau (BDT)
- Hosted by the Ministry of Information and Communication Technology (MICT) of Thailand.
- The WTIM will be preceded by a two-day meeting of the Expert Group on Telecommunication/ICT Indicators (EGTI), in the same location.
- The WTIM, open to all the membership, is primarily targeted at those responsible for ICT statistics in relevant Ministries, regulatory agencies, telecommunication operating companies and national statistical offices. Experts interested in the subject of information society measurements are also welcome to attend the meeting.

The WTIM 2012 will address, among others, the following topics:

- The national coordination of ICT statistics
- Measuring fixed and mobile broadband, including pricing, traffic and capacity
- Measuring progress towards the achievement of the WSIS outcomes (jointly organized with the Partnership on Measuring ICT for Development)
- Revisions to the indicators on household ICT access and individual ICT usage
- Measuring gender-related ICT indicators
- Emerging issues such as measuring digital broadcasting, including IPTV
- Results of the work carried out by the EGTI since the 9th WTIM

- The Report reflects a joint effort among several international organisations, led by ITU and including contributions from UNESCO, WHO and UNDESA, as well as from representatives of civ society.




Partnership on Measuring ICT for Development

Monitoring the WSIS targets: 10 targets and 49 indicators to

assess the global information society

- A response to the WSIS call to develop indicators for measuring the information society
- A concrete list of indicators, definitions, data collection methodologies, to monitor the 10 WSIS targets
- A practical tool for policy makers and data producers in developing countries to help them measure progress
- The main reference document for the final WSIS review prepared by the Partnership in 2014
- A number of countries have started tracking the WSIS targets based on this framework (e.g. Ecuador)

Data situation - WSIS Targets MEASURING ICT FOR DEVELOPMENT


- Good progress and/or data available: ICT infrastructure, household access to ICT, connecting research centers (targets 1, 8, 10)
- Medium progress and/or data available: connecting villages, individual use of ICT, ICT in education (targets 1, 2, 7, 10)
- Little/no data: ICT in health, e-government, online content, language diversity, connecting archives, museums, libraries (targets 4, 5, 6, 9)
- New indictors/targets beyond WSIS: business use of ICT, ICT sector, e-waste, gender, online safety and cybersecurity, usercreated content, ICT skills and employment








WSIS Action Lines- C2/C5/C6: ROADMAPS

ITU continues to play a key role in the WSIS implementation and follow-up process in particular, as the WSIS Action Lines **Sole Facilitator for:**

AL C2 (ICT Infrastructure),
AL C5 (Building Confidence and Security in the Use of ICTs) and
AL C6 (Enabling Environment).



Roadmaps are detailed plans to guide progress towards achieving the WSIS goals. They provide a broad vision and detailed overview of the activities planned within the mandate of the Union.





United Nations Group on the Information Society (UNGIS)

- UNGIS 2012-2013 Work Plan was approved during the UNGIS meetings at WSIS Forum 2012
- ICT and UNDAF: UN Development Assistance Framework
- Joint Initiative: Mobile for Development
- RIO+ Conference: UNGIS submitted a joint contribution and organized a side event at RIO+20 on ICTs, the foundation of our sustainable future.

- WSIS outcome documents and the UN General Assembly Resolution 60/252
 resolved to conduct an Overall Review of the Implementation of the WSIS
 Outcomes in 2015.
- The ITU Plenipotentiary Resolution 172 (PP-10) on the Overall Review of the Implementation of the Outcomes of the WSIS; including the possibility of holding a high-level event in 2014/2015, had requested ITU Secretary General to initiate the preparatory process at the UN Chief Executives Board (CEB).
- Consequently, in 2011 CEB tasked UNGIS, under ITU leadership, to prepare, on the basis of an open consultation, an Plan of Action for the WSIS Overall Review (WSIS+10). The Board requested UNGIS to present the Plan of Action at its spring 2012 session.



Origins of the Consultations

- 2011 ECOSOC Resolution (2011/16) requested UNGIS to report on the outcomes
 of the UNGIS consultation to the 15th Session of the Commission on the Science
 and Technology for Development.
- In April 2012 UN High Level Committee on Programmes noted the plan and forwarded to CEB for its endorsement. During the CEB Spring Session held at ITU Headquarters in April 2012, the plan was approved.
- Following the ITU Council Resolution 1334, the ITU Secretary General had proposed to the CEB that the ITU should play a leading managerial role in the process of the Overall Review of the Implementation of the WSIS Outcomes (WSIS+10). This proposal was endorsed by the CEB during its spring session of 2012.



Origins of the Consultations

- In May 2012, UNGIS Plan of Action was presented to the 15th Session of the Commission on Science and Technology for Development.
- 2012 July ECOSOC Resolution (2012/5), while taking a note on the outcomes of the UNGIS open consultation requested General Assembly to make decision on the modalities of the overall review (WSIS+10) at its 67th session.



UNGIS Open Consultation Process

- More than 140 countries participated
- FOUR integral COMPONENTS: Physical Meetings, Online
 Consultations, Official Submissions, Plenaries at the WSIS Forum
- ONE OUTCOME with TWO PILLARS:
 - 1. Plan of Action
 - 2. Proposal of Expected Final Outcomes of the Overall Review Process (WSIS+10)
 - Evaluation and Assessment Reports
 - Forward looking outcome setting an agenda beyond 2015




